

Pastor's Message

In late June, a map of the United States was posted on an evening news channel. The map was color-coded. indicating the trends for COVID-19 infection rates in each state. For that one of a government day, Michigan had the largest weekly drop in viral infections in the USA. Our State had the lowest infection rate in the nation; I pray that we can maintain this status.

What caught my attention was the map's posting on social media and the accompanying comments related to the graphic. In and among the run-of-themill comments was the following observation: "The west side of the state suffered for the east side." It is a true statement. We on the western side did suffer for the east, and our suffering helped to contain the spread of the disease. It is the biblical implication of this comment that I want to explore.

Jesus' suffering on the cross gave meaning and purpose to suffering. Suffering for the sake of another can be holy work. It can have redemptive value. Jesus suffering humiliation and torture during his Passion for the sake of my sin makes me pause. If God was willing to subject Himself to such treatment for me, then I will hopefully be willing to suffer for another's benefit.

Making a sacrifice for the greater good and suffering the consequences is held up by the Apostle Paul in almost all of his letters. Granted, Paul encourages

believers to voluntarily enter into sacrifice and suffering instead mandate that brought about this recent suffering. Perhaps the pain, inconvenience and suffering of the past months can be understood as an

act taken for the good of the whole, for the love of neighbor.

Jesus taught us to love our neighbor as we love ourselves. To insure that we didn't narrowly define "neighbor" to mean somebody we like or agree with, Jesus told the Parable of the Good Samaritan. Samaritans were despised by the Jews, yet they were used in the parable to broaden the understanding of "neighbor."

We in Southwest Michigan did suffer for our fellow citizens on the eastern side of the state. We were asked to make sacrifices for people we probably will never meet. We suffered for people we didn't know, people who still are our neighbors.

When I view the events of the past 4 months through the lens of caring for my neighbor, it makes the changes I've been forced to deal with, the suffering I've had to go through, well worth the effort.

As a new season begins, here are five spiritual disciplines you can practice to make time with God a daily habit.

Give thanks

"We give thanks to you, O God; we give thanks, for your name is near. We recount your wondrous deeds." – Psalms 75:1

Have you experienced healing? Answered prayers? Breakthrough in the life of someone you love? Salvation? As you seek God's heart for this new season, take a moment to thank Him for what He's already done.

Spend 5 minutes in silence

"Abide in me, and I in you. As the branch cannot bear fruit by itself, unless it abides in the vine, neither can you, unless you abide in me." – John 15:4

Abiding in Jesus starts with stillness. Pause, take a deep breath, and give anything concerning you over to God. Spend 5 minutes centering your heart on the One who matters most.

Remember Whose you are

"You are not your own, for you were bought with a price. So glorify God in your body." -

1 Corinthians 6:19-20

God loves you. (Let that sink in.) The price He paid

for you cost Him everything. Remind yourself of Whose you are, and then confidently dream big with God for this new season.

Meditate on God's Word

"Oh how I love your law! It is my meditation all the day." – Psalms 119:97

How does Jesus want you to live? One of the best ways to find out is to spend time in Scripture. As you do, ask God to speak to you through His Words about what your next right step should be.

Focus on what is excellent

"...If there is any excellence, if there is anything worthy of praise, think about these things." – Philippians 4:8

You have been given the mind of Christ. If you're not sure of what you should do in your next season, try asking yourself: What is praiseworthy? What decisions would honor God? Make a list of whatever comes to mind, and intentionally pursue those things.


